TIMPERLEY DUKE OF EDINBURGH AWARD CENTRE

1. Introduction

This report covers the period from registration of the Centre as a charity on 10th December 2018 to 30th September 2019. The Centre was set up in November 2015 by the PCC at Holy Cross Church Timperley. It has grown significantly from 60 members in its first year to 130 in September 2018 at which point it relocated to Altrincham Kersal Rugby Club (AKRFC) and registered as an independent charity.

The centre now has 200 active members supported by 50 adult volunteer leaders and a network of freelance supervisors. During the year members undertook in excess of 4,000 hours of volunteer activity within the local community. Over 95% of participants who completed their expeditions at the centre went on to complete the Award.

The centre benefits from the support of local and national sponsors including the Oglesby Charitable Trust, Manchester Airport Community Fund, Trafford Housing Trust, Newton Night School Charity, Go Outdoors, and Dixons Carphone. In addition a number of organisations including Epam, Mott McDonald and DeTrafford actively support their employees who invest time leading expedition activities. We are very grateful to all of our sponsors and supporters.

2. The Duke of Edinburgh Award (DofE)

The DofE Award provides a balanced programme of activities that develops the whole person – mind, body and soul – in an environment of social interaction and teamworking. Young people progress through three levels of DofE programmes to achieve a Bronze, Silver or Gold Award. Taking part builds confidence and develops self-esteem. It requires persistence, commitment and has a lasting impact on the attitudes and outlook of all young people who do their DofE. It is open to participants aged between 14 and 24.

All participants are registered with the DofE through the eDofE website. This tracks participation in the three elements of the Award which comprise:

- Volunteering this is about making a difference to other people's lives. From
 conservation to youth work to fundraising for charity or caring for animals there is
 an extensive list of projects that the members are involved in. Our community is
 benefiting from over 180 hours per week of volunteering through the Award
- Physical through this section participants achieve greater physical fitness and become healthier through a wide range of activities both personal or through teamwork.
- Skills this is all about developing practical and social skills and personal interests.
 There is an extensive list of skills which the young people may develop

In addition participants take part in expeditions which involve overnight camping for one night for the bronze award, two nights for silver, and three nights for the Gold Award.

3. Centre Development Plan

The long term aim of the volunteer supporters is to establish a sustainable DofE capability and to become self sufficient in the training and assessment of participants. The period under review has been a time of significant change for the centre the key highlights of which have been:

- Registration as an independent charity and appointment of Trustees
- Relocation of the centre to AKRFC, investment in improved stores facilities and further camping equipment
- Recruitment of further volunteers and implementation of more comprehensive organisational structure
- Outreach to wider community
- Implementation of more pro-active brokering of volunteering opportunities with local charities and community including creation of opportunities to support AKRFC and the Church
- Scale up to over 180 places
- Further training of expedition leaders including tailored safeguarding training and sponsorship of leaders undertaking accredited awards (the DofE Expeditions Skills, Lowland Leader and Mountain Leader qualification)
- Creation of more comprehensive eDofE and mentoring support

Throughout this programme the DofE regional team have supported us through training programmes, open evenings and set up of the eDofE system. In particular thanks are due to Paul Griffiths, Matt Woodcock, Steph Ashcroft and the team at DofE North for their inspiration and guidance.

4. Supporting infrastructure

Equipment & procurement

To date over £12,000 has been raised from our sponsors and member subscriptions to provide the following equipment:

- Group equipment comprising tents, stoves, cooking pans, maps, compasses and first aid kits. This equipment was funded by donations from the Oglesby Charitable Trust, Manchester Airport Community Fund.
- Personal equipment including waterproof jackets, overtrousers, sleeping bags, roll mats, and further rucksacks. This equipment was funded by the Trafford Housing Trust (THT) Community Action Fund and Newton Night School Charity who also provided funding to improve storage facilities

Most of the equipment has been purchased from Go Outdoors. Go Outdoors have been very supportive of the centre, providing personnel to deliver a Kit Briefing Evening for participants and their parents, and discounts for members to buy their personal equipment.

Premises, storage & transport

Training, expedition planning and presentations take place at AKRFC. We are grateful to the team at AKRFC for making us feel so welcome in our first year of operation there and we are looking forward to making further use of the facilities for training in the 2020 season.

Thanks are due to Wellington School for allowing us to use their minibuses to transport participants on expeditions that are further afield.

The centre made a cash surplus of £6,132 during the period. A surplus of £6,634 was transferred from Timperley PCC taking the cumulative total cash reserves to £12,766 at 30th September 2019.

The accounts are prepared on a cash basis in accordance with Charities Commission guidelines. There are a number of accruals and liabilities which must be taken into account to fully understand the financial position. The Charity will be making a contribution to AKRFC for the hire of the hall (£1,000 for the year) and as at 30th September registration fees of £800 had been received in respect of the 2019-20 expedition season. The underlying net asset position is therefore £10,966 at 30th September 2019.

The centre continues to benefit from economies of scale and a greater proportion of expeditions being supervised by volunteers.

Roz Swarbrick continues to perform the role of Treasurer and thanks are due to Roz for her hard work in keeping track of growing numbers of subscriptions and expedition / operating expenses. We are also grateful to Deborah Chalcraft for conducting an independent review of the accounts.

6. Participation & outputs

Award Completion

On 30th April 2019 we held our third Annual Awards presentation. Manchester United premiership player Chris Smalling presented 114 awards at Bronze (53), Silver (51) and Gold (10) levels. A full list of members who completed their Bronze and Silver Awards is set out in Appendix 1. Nationally the proportion of DofE participants who complete their expeditions and go on to finish their awards is 52%. We set ourselves a target to achieve in excess of 80% and achieved over 95%.



A large part of this success is down to the encouragement our eDofE mentor team provide to participants to ensure they sign off on the Award sections. This team is lead by Emma Deighton-Brown supported by Fiona Buckley, Charlotte Skitterall, Michelle Ball and Liz Stagg. Steph Carter from the Bowdon Church DofE Centre continues to be very supportive and performs the role of independent verifier.

Volunteering and community outreach

The impact that participants have on their communities through volunteering activity is viewed by the Centre as an important output of the programme. Bev Stackhouse coordinates volunteer activities and has provided support for members by working with local charities to signpost opportunities.

As a result this year members have undertaken over 4,000 hours of volunteer activity. The range of activities is set out in appendix 2.

7. Inclusivity & Outreach

Although Timperley is a relatively affluent area the Centre places great emphasis on taking an 'everyone welcome' approach which encourages participation from a range of children from varying socio-economic and ethnic groups. The Centre is an Open Award centre promoted throughout Trafford. Most members are drawn from local schools and come from the Altrincham area.

An extensive programme of promotion of outreach was undertaken including:

- Trafford Centre for Independent Living we now have a participant registered following promotion through this charity. The links with this group attracted media interest (see appendix)
- Promotion to residents in the Broadheath community through posters in local shops and utilising the Trafford Housing Trust Engagement Officer to promote through both THT and Trafford Council databases
- Links to the Trafford Young Carers charity

Places at the centre are allocated based upon the following principles:

- Inclusivity available to a broad range of young people from all backgrounds
- Adding value we are particularly keen to offer DofE to those young people for whom participation will have the greatest benefit
- **Sustainability** we want to make DofE at Timperley a long term project with enough adult volunteers to ensure it can continue for many years to come

The demographic mix of members is set out in the following tables. This is based on eDofE system data for registered participants. Where participants are finishing off an earlier level and have not yet registered for the next level they will not be included in the first table relating to gender, ethnicity and disability, but will be included in the breakdown by school.

Whilst participation remains skewed towards selective schools this is reflective of the local demographic and the Centre team is making every effort to widen its reach as set out in section 7. The volunteer group wish to ensure that the centre remains accessible to children of all backgrounds. The cost of personal equipment required for the expedition in addition to the subscription fee can be prohibitive. The cost of personal equipment is c£250 so the pool of personal equipment funded by THT is vital to ensuring that the Award remains affordable.

Through the use of an extensive group of volunteers and by managing expedition planning, risk assessment, insurance, and training in house, rather than through the use of commercial providers we are able to keep costs to a minimum without compromising quality. The centre is one of the most affordable in the area.

8. Leadership Team & governance

The Centre is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) governed by a governing document which is available on the Charity Commission website. Its Charitable objects are:

To help young people in the Trafford area by providing opportunities for them to participate in the Duke of Edinburgh Award and thereby to develop their capabilities that they may grow to full maturity as individuals and members of society.

We continue our programme of leader training both for expedition leadership at DofE Expedition Skills (DES) level and Lowland Leader level through courses provided by the DofE North team. A growing number of leaders are now Expedition Assessor Accreditation Scheme (EAAS) accredited allowing them to assess expeditions.

All volunteers are recruited in accordance with the Charity policy for the safe recruitment of youth leaders and are subject to DBS checks. We are grateful for the continued support of Caroline Royle our Safeguarding Officer. All leaders undertake safeguarding training and are fully briefed on the centre policies and risk assessments.
